Licence Application objection:

Application for a premises licence at
Grousefields Farm, Darbury Leas by Cupps
Barns Group Ltd.

I wish to object to the licence application for the
following reasons.

It is well documented that the majority of cases
of Crime and Disorder, public nuisance and public
safety occurs following late night drinking once
the attendees leave the constraints of the site/venue
and move onto the streets or in this case the
lanes in and around Grousefields Farm

Grousefields Farm is located in a very quiet
rural area of Derbyshire surrounded by
small communities. Communities such as,

Darbury Leas, Long Lane, Thurstaston, Kirk Langley,
Ladbourne Braithford and the hamlet of Over
burrows. The road network consists of unlit,
lanes and single track lanes. It is not suitable
for high volumes of traffic containing
people who have had an evening of drinking.
Police access is limited since the closure of
Ashbourne Police station. All day drinking
will lead to late night noise, anti social
behaviour and public order issues and the only
way to stop these problems is to refuse the
licence application.

If possible please suggest alterations to the application that would resolve the problem mentioned above, again paying attention to the licensing objectives

1/ Refuse a licence would be the most sensible as this would ensure that the rural communities remain unaffected by the problems caused by late night drinking

2/ If SDDC are unable to be bold and refuse the application then they should at the very least, reduce the licence to operate only on a Friday and Saturday not the seven days a week as applied for.

The licence hours should also be reduced from 14 hours per day to 11 hours ie 1200 to 2300

3/ See Section J of the application SDDC should not allow the operator to sell alcohol to people leaving the site ~~at~~ late at night up to 0100 in the morning. This will only encourage continuation of drinking in the lanes and communities around Braughfield Farm.

We all have a duty to protect our rural landscape and rural communities, there are plenty of venues for weddings, late night drinking we must not allow them to creep into the countryside.

Once the Licensing Section has received this form you will receive a written acknowledgement. Your representation will be forwarded to the applicant and/or their representative who may contact you in order to discuss your representations.

This form must be received by the Licensing Authority within the statutory representation period.
