1.0 Purpose of Report

1.1 To inform the Council of the broad outcome of the "Ideas into Action" consultation exercise and make recommendations regarding how we progress those ideas and the issues they raise.

2.0 Recommendations

- 2.1 That the Council notes the issues arising from "Ideas into Action" consultation and recognises them in our service and budget plans for the future.
- 2.2 That Policy Committees consider the ideas submitted and determine their preferred actions, and make appropriate recommendations to Finance and Management Committee on 30 November. These may include submission of service development proposals for the Budget 2007/10 and proposals for more immediate actions that require one off or low level funding.

3.0 Detail

The Consultation Process

- 3.1 We launched the campaign at the Parish Forum meeting and it featured at all the Area Meetings in the summer. Ideas were submitted on short simple forms, our website or handwritten notes. The closing date for submission was 4 October but this deadline was extended, principally for Parish Councils and to fit in with their meeting schedule.
- 3.2 We received 65 ideas, which included: -
 - · Specific complaints about issues such as untidy land
 - Requests for improved services to the whole district, such as collecting plastics for recycling
 - Ideas for local initiatives that require funding or other support to get the idea launched.

- Suggestions where the Council has little influence, such as dismantling electricity pylons and laying the cables underground
- 3.3 All suggestions have been acknowledged by letter and will receive a detailed response when we have decided the best course of action.

Where we can take action on a complaint straight away we are doing so and will inform the individual of what we are doing, when it will happen and a contact name of who is responsible.

Where there is no cost, we will review whether we can implement the suggestion sooner than that. In both cases, we will inform individuals of the outcome.

Where we are not responsible for the service, we have passed the suggestion on to the relevant body or partner. We try to ensure that the individual receives a satisfactory response to their idea.

3.4 A summary of all the ideas submitted is attached at Annexe 2.

The Overall Picture

- 3.5 We have analysed the list of ideas and the majority can be grouped into a smaller number of key issues. It is important that we respond to the issues that are behind the individual ideas so that we do not just respond to individual current problems or complaints. The key issues we have identified are listed below.
 - Litter / Cléanliness
 - Graffiti
 - Better Recycling Facilities / Collections
 - Untidy Sites
 - More Trees, Flowers and Spring Bulbs
 - Traffic Issues, Highway Maintenance and Improvements
 - Support for Neighbourhood Watch
 - Better Facilities for Children and Young People
- 3.6 Ideas for improving services across the district or developing local initiatives that will cost more money will need to be considered by Members. Some of these have significant costs and will need a Service Development Proposal that will be scored within the Budget process.
- 3.7 Others have relatively small one off or ongoing costs that Members may wish to consider outside of that process. The thrust of the initiative was ACTION and we ought to consider whether we can react quickly to some of the low cost ideas. Some of the ideas within the emerging key issues have been considered by the Corporate Management Team and these are listed in the table at Annexe 1, with suggestions about action and timescales. CMT have also identified a number of generic actions that respond to the issues that lie behind the suggestions, particularly in relation to cleaner and greener issues.

Proposed Actions

- Policy committees will have their own thoughts about the suggestions and how we should prioritise our responses. It is therefore suggested that each policy committee considers this report so that they can consider and determine their position in relation to these suggestions.
- 3.9 Finance and Management Committee are scheduled to review the budget position at their meeting on 30 November and there may be an opportunity at that time to provide funding for some of the one off or low cost suggestions. It would be appropriate for the 2 other policy committees to make prioritised recommendations for these so that Finance & Management Committee could approve a list of short term proposals, should finance be available.

4.0 Conclusions

- 4.1 The consultation process has engaged a number of individuals and organisations across the district and the majority of ideas suggested fall into broad headings that are strongly related to our published priorities.
- 4.2 There is now an opportunity to deliver on a number of these ideas and, after consultation with the Policy Committees, Finance and Management Committee could consider allocating available resources to some of the one off or low cost proposals.
- 4.3 If we can respond positively to a significant number of the ideas submitted, it will deliver improvements in the area of our Corporate Plan priorities and also show a clear commitment to listening to our communities and acting on what they are telling us.
